

Incident Details	Warnings / Lessons Learned
	Make sure medical release forms are filled out by science party and turned in to the Captain prior to cruise departure.
Mariner hit left side ribs against corner of high backed couch in the conference room when the ship lurched from a moderate sea.	
Infection due to centipede bite. Patient was bitten shoreside then the wound got infected while at sea. Given antibiotics which worked well.	GWMMA can be very helpful in prescribing proper antibiotics for infections
Mariner bruised knee while tending gear on aft deck when ship unexpectedly pitched.	
Mariner experienced stomach pain at sea - GWMMA was consulted. Visited their shoreside medical provider upon return for resolution.	
Object in eye	
Two cases of Diarrhea	
Eleven cases of COVID. Two required quarantine, the others had light or no symptoms. Masked and maintained social distance for five days after positive test.	



Mariner was rushing while going up a ladder. Their foot slipped off the stair tread and they hit their shin causing bruising, slight pain and skin abrasion.	
Mariner was lifting a box of soda syrup and strained right shoulder area.	
Three cases of sea sickness requiring administration of sea sickness medicine and needing to make an unscheduled port call to discharge one crew member	
One case of possible kidney stones that resulted in discharging the crew member during a scheduled port call.	
2 cases of GI issues requiring medical attention following port calls in India.	
Mariner was stuck by stingray barb when dumping codend.	
Mariner was stuck by shrimp spine when sorting catch.	
Mariner strained shoulder when handling lines on cruise departure.	



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Shore support person tripped out on dock while moving large ship shore power cable into position for the vessels return to port, tripped over shore power cable. The fall caused the person to land hard on their knees, elbows and side. No medical treatment was needed, just some ice and easy work the next few days.	Be careful when moving heavy shore power cable/equipment, maybe have 2 people to make job easier.
While fabricating a part, mariner got a metal sliver in eye while wearing goggles, due to rubbing forehead when removing the googles.	Be aware that PPE can reduce injury, but not eliminate the risk.
	Make sure people wear gloves while handling during wire winding
Person got a wire fiber shard in wrist while wire winding from cable end strands	
Three cases of sea sickness	
Three cases of possible kidney stones	
Mariner sent ashore to clinic due to feeling flu like symptoms. Negative COVID test. Return to vessel with cold medicine.	
Crew member went ashore to skateboard and injured Achilles tendon	Captains should think twice when allowing crew ashore for liberty during very short port (4-6 HOURS). Vessel sailed one AB short due to an injury suffered while skateboarding ashore.
Mariner lost crown on tooth and was sent ashore for a temporary crown.	



Mariner had rash due to poor hygiene. Sent to clinic and returned with bacitracin ointment.	
Mariner suffered from chest pain requiring shoreside evaluation from anchorage.	
	Always check power status before working on electrical wiring and lockout breaker/disconnect.
Service technician was shocked by live wire on pump switch.
